Winter lookback

OVER THE WINTER THE countryside rangers ran events from the active on *yer bike to Barrhead* to the sedate *crafty Christmas*.

On a cold November morning 14 cyclists set off from Darnley Mill. The event included a free bike inspection from Dr Bike and cycle and mobility scooter hire. Later that month Waulkmill Glen provided the perfect spot to celebrate national tree week with tales of folklore and mythology.

In December everyone had a great time at Auchenback Resource Centre making willow stars, holly wreaths and other natural decorations, and the three and a half mile *walk off your Christmas spirit* event helped shed the holiday excesses.

Nature detectives were looking for animal *tracks and trails* around Darnley Mill in January. Some were spotted, including deer tracks, but the earlier rain made most signs elusive.

The new website has pages with news and events, how to get to the park, details on walking, cycling and riding routes and dedicated sections on wildlife and history.



Spotlight on park history

The mystery of the Waulkmill Glen ruins



Debate surrounds the use of the 150 year old Waulkmill Glen ruins.

IF YOU PEER INTO WAULKMILL GLEN WOODS FROM Corselet Road you might make out an enigmatic ruin nestled amongst the trees.

The two storey building first appeared on the Ordnance Survey map around 150 years ago.

The building has led to much debate. Evidence points to both a residential purpose, with its large bay windows, dressed sandstone exterior walls and interior plaster, and an industrial one, suggested by the apparent lack of chimneys or hearths, the large windows and stone lined water channels around and beneath it.

It seems likely, given its age, that the building is related to the Darnley Bleachfields/Printfields.

The bleachfield was in decline by the 1860s and the structure may have been allowed to deteriorate after a short period of use.

It could be in these buildings that Charles Tennant experimented with chemical bleaching compounds, the water channels suggest a connection to a process that produced liquid waste.

It is also possible that the building served as a "woman house", as described in the First Statistical Account by the Reverend Monteath published in 1791, where women who were not married lived during the summer season while working at the bleachfields.

The building may never have been finished or rarely used. The apparent lack of heating suggests that the building never served a domestic purpose, although intriguingly in this photograph it does appear that you can make out the faint outline of a chimney.

The mystery continues and the Waulkmill Glen ruins, nestled in the woods at Dams to Darnley, will spark debate for some time.

Visitors to the area should remember that Waulkmill Glen ruins is in a dangerous condition so you should keep out of the building itself.

Calling all D2D volunteers

THE COUNTRYSIDE rangers are looking into starting a country park volunteer group.

This is a chance for you to regularly get involved in protecting and improving the country park.

The group could get involved in all sorts of projects from wild flower planting to water vole surveying.

The charismatic water vole (*Arvicola terrestris*) is an important local species.

It features in the Glasgow Local Biodiversity Action Plan which contains objectives and targets for promoting its long term viability.

Across Scotland the water vole is one of our most threatened native

mammals. It was once abundant throughout Britain, but there's been a dramatic decline since 1950.

Volunteers were invited to join countryside rangers to give the park a spring clean on 28 February.

Spinal path linking Darnley Mill to Balgray Reservoir

The spinal path is a two and a quarter mile linear tarmac route through the heart of the country park, linking Darnley Mill to Balgray Reservoir.

The northern half runs along Corselet Road, a very quiet public road with no footpath, just off Nitshell Road at the Ashoka restaurant.


The network of paths in Darnley Mill, which you can get to from Nitshell Road and Southpark village, also connect with Corselet Road.

The southern half takes in Waulkmill Glen and the Barrhead dams. It also passes under one of the 14 arches of the Victorian railway viaduct which carries the Neilston line. This part of the route is not open to traffic but is sometimes used by service vehicles.

The southern end joins the Balgray Reservoir path on the other side of Aurs Road. This is a busy road between Newton Mearns and Barrhead, so great care needs to be taken in crossing.

Most of the route is flat, but there is a gentle rise between Darnley Mill and Waulkmill Glen and a steeper section up to Waulkmill Glen Reservoir.

The route has narrow kissing gates at Waulkmill Glen and Aurs Road, just before the start of the Balgray Reservoir path. Improvements to make these gates accessible to all users are planned.



Spotlight on bluebells

THE BLUEBELL IS A WELL known feature of British woodlands and in the park they can be found in Waulkmill Glen woods.

Growing up to 30cm tall and bending over at the top, these bell-shaped flowers are visible during April and May, creating a fabulous carpet of lavender-blue.

Internationally the bluebell has a restricted distribution, so local populations are important. In Glasgow it has its own species action plan as part of Glasgow Local Biodiversity Action Plan.

The bluebell is a protected species under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 so it's a criminal offence to remove the bulbs of wild bluebells. See the events calendar for May's bluebell walk.

BLUEBELL FACTS

Honey bees can steal nectar by biting a hole in the bottom of the bell, reaching the nectar without pollinating the flower.

Like many blue flowers, pink and white forms occur naturally in the wild.

Bluebells were used for glue in book binding and fixing arrow flights and as a source of starch for linen processing.

Two Royal Navy ships have been named HMS Bluebell.



Bluebells are protected and can be seen at the park in April and May.
