Connecting Woodside will make it easier and safer to travel around by foot and bike, transforming the area into a more attractive and accessible place for all.

This will be achieved by improving the look, feel and function of streets and spaces, reducing the negative impacts of traffic volume and speed. The expected outcomes of the project will also include health and environmental benefits for all people living in and visiting Woodside & Woodlands.

A network of routes on quiet streets which are pleasant and safe to walk and cycle, supporting people in their everyday journeys.


Physically separated cycle routes

... What's happened so far?

20mph zone rolling out



Part 1 of the 20mph zone has been rolled out east of Maryhill Road. This is one of several measures to make this a place where people feel safe and comfortable making their everyday journeys. Part 2, covering the rest of the project area, is expected to be in place later this year.

More accessible streets



We've dropped kerbs in 22 locations, making it easier for everyone to get about in Woodside.

2 new bike hire stations, with 1 to follow

120+ new bike parking spaces and counting



We've installed over 120 new bike parking spaces so you can lock your bike while you're out and about. This includes 8 secure spaces delivered in partnership with Queens Cross Housing Association.

We've improved the pedestrian and cycle cut through on Hopehill Road, planting grass and trees. **What do you think?**




... When will it all happen?

Connecting Woodside is a big project, so it will be delivered in phases.

All work is expected to be completed by the end of 2021.
