I can advise that valid disabled badge holders are accommodated within these proposals, disabled badge holders will be able to park within the Event Day Parking Zone as long as the disabled badge is displayed on the vehicle.

I can advise that dropping off and picking up can be accommodated within these proposals, anyone wishing to drop off or pick up can do so in areas where loading and unloading is permitted, e.g. within the Event Day Parking Zone.

I can advise that there is no evidence to suggest that the introduction of parking controls will have a detrimental effect on the area, in contrast those using public transport may be more likely to spend time in the area and add to the local economy than those bringing their private car.

The area covered by these proposals has been highlighted as being negatively affected by current parking practices and this is why these proposals have been drawn up. It is hoped that these proposals will encourage the use of

The Glasgow City Council (Ibrox Stadium) (Event Day Emergency Routes and Parking Zone)

I refer to the proposed order noted above.

I believe that the proposals will detrimentally affect Rangers Football Club, its supporters and other associated local businesses who rely on Rangers for their trade. Rangers Football Club is a significant economic driver in the local community and brings untold millions to the Glasgow economy. I find it incredulous that Glasgow City Council is actively trying to discourage revenue coming into the city.

I believe that implementing this proposal is extremely unwise as there is not enough public transport to cope with the demands resulting from a match day at Ibrox.

I believe Rangers to be a key part of the local community and a positive influence on the local area and as such the interests of them and their supporters should be wholly considered in any plans related to parking at Ibrox.

I do not believe it is appropriate to push through a plan without ensuring that appropriate steps are in place to ensure that the tens of thousands of Rangers supporters who travel by car are not prevented from attending the local area.

I believe guarantees and additional capacity is required for the local subway stations and there is a requirement for a rail station before this could even be considered being implemented. I have major concerns that this order will not resolve any traffic problems; it will just move them further away cause issues in areas previously unaffected.

Would it not be a better idea to guarantee emergency routes not to have any parking on one side of each applicable street/road marked with double yellow lines which would ensure emergency route access.

I have major concerns that this decision is being taken without all of the factors and potential consequences being considered and seek reassurance that the local community will not be hindered by this decision and as a member of the local community we are keen to ensure Rangers FC supporters are treated fairly.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to object in the strongest possible terms to the parking restrictions that are being proposed around Ibrox Stadium on matchdays.

These restrictions will cause serious problems for supporters of Rangers FC being able to get to and from the stadium. The proposal seems unworkable and will likely cause more problems than it will solve. Another factor that must be consider is that the public transport links are already at breaking point on matchdays and this will add considerably more pressure to Subways, Buses and Trains. Any plan with credibility would've included plans to re-open the Ibrox railway station which would have served to benefit not only Rangers supporters but the wider community.

The proposal will only serve to push parking congestion to outside the perimeter and cause issues in this area rather than around the stadium.

In finishing this is a ridiculous proposal that clearly hasn't been considered or researched properly. It should be abandoned until such time as something that is workable and safe is put forward.

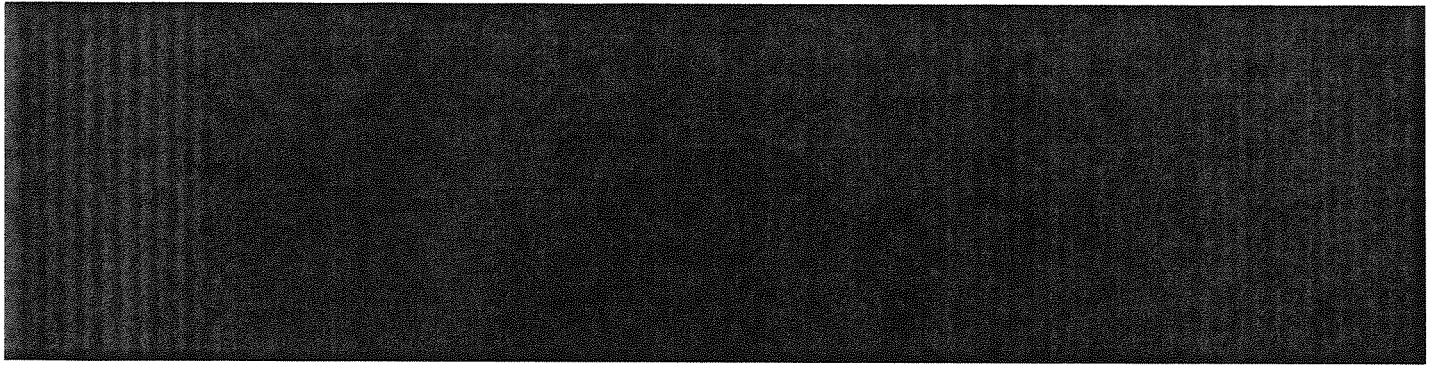

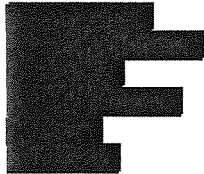

The system as it currently stands is a big enough problem but after seeing the new proposals I have to say that it's not acceptable. 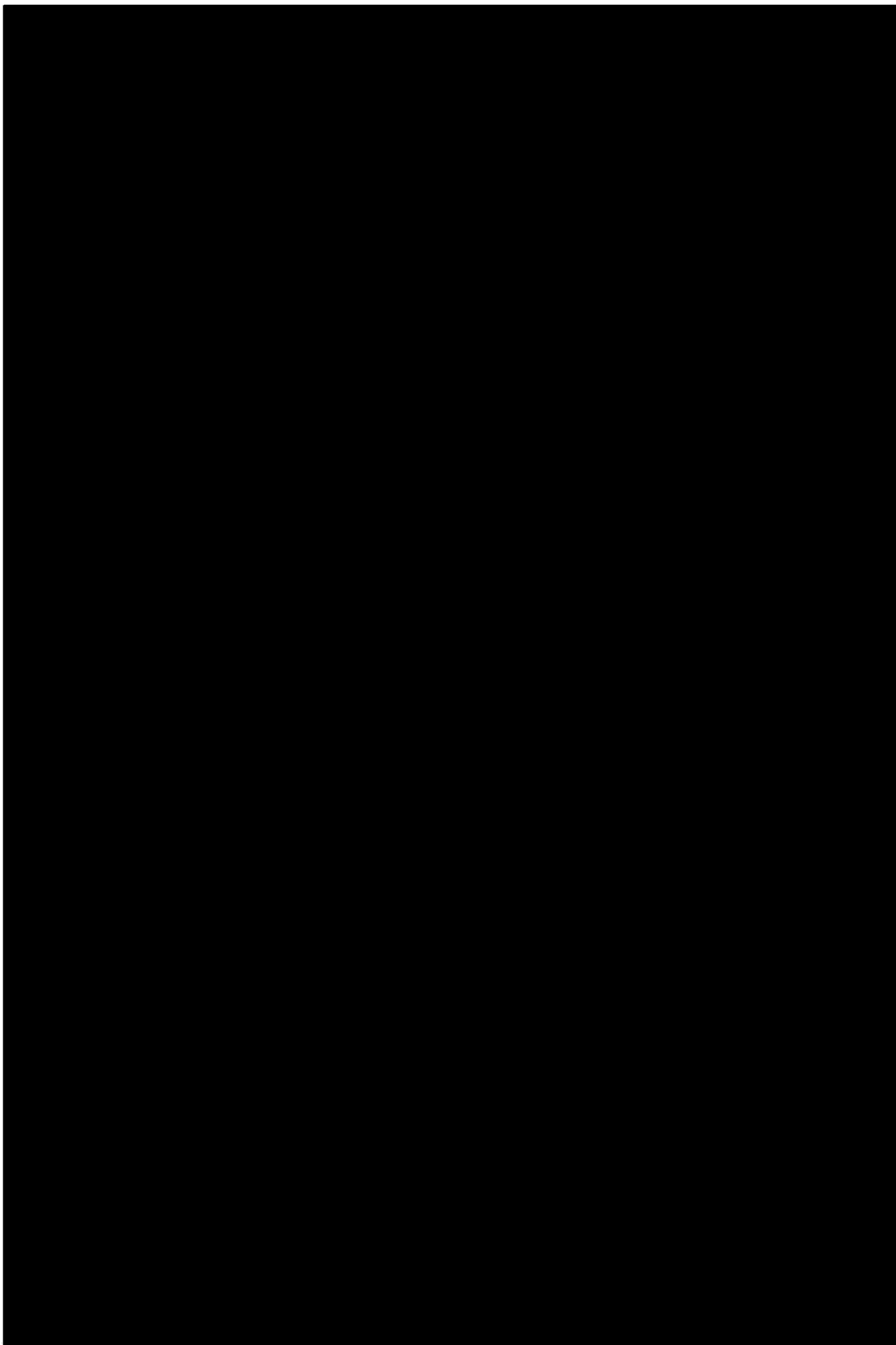

Rangers are a key part of the local community and a positive influence on the local area and as such the interests of them and their supporters should be wholly considered in any plans related to parking at Ibrox.

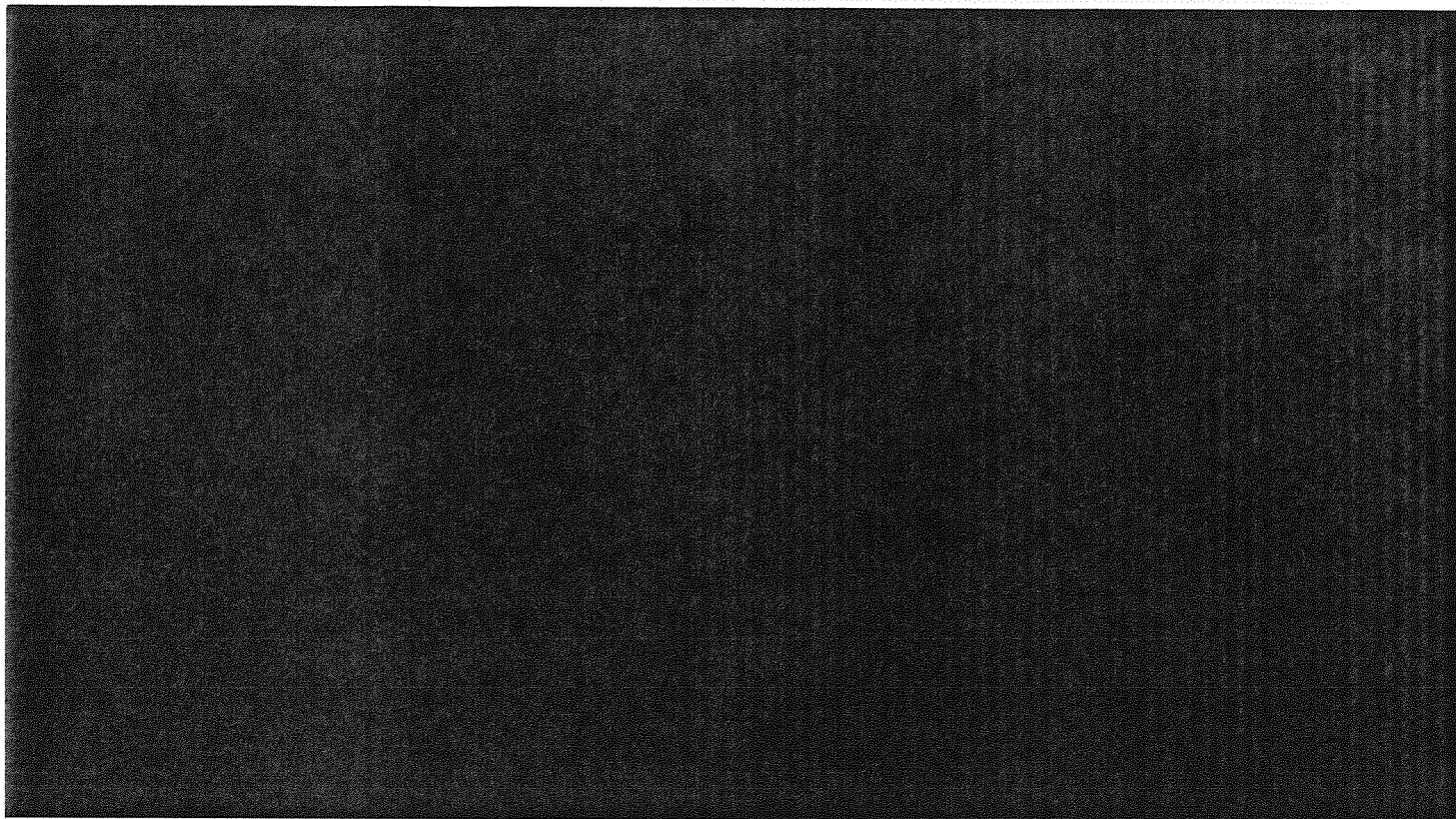

Whatever the reasons for the proposed parking restrictions around Ibrox, I object to them on the following grounds.

Firstly, I mostly use the underground to & from Ibrox and arrive early so not to be crushed in the underground. I also walk to [REDACTED] post match to try and minimise the same as I am slightly claustrophobic.

I feel if the proposal goes through then there will obviously be more people using the underground which would have it bursting at the seams. Unless you can confirm that there would need to be a substantial increase in the amount of trains between one hour before kick off & one hour after the match.

Secondly, when not using the underground I take my car, giving a lift to my friend's elderly father who although can walk unaided, would not be able to walk the distances required outwith the restricted zone. He is NOT a blue badge holder and I am sure going to Ibrox 2/3 times a month would not be a good enough reason for one.

Thirdly, pretty much the same as point 2, a few years ago after an operation I had to use crutches to assist in walking, unable to use the underground due to accessibility I had to get a lift by car, having to park further away would have stopped me attending.

Fourthly, the issues bringing these proposals will surely just be moved to the areas immediately outside the restricted zones.

Fifth, I am serious here, the guys who "watch yer motor mister" will need to make up their £40 - £50 every 2 weeks or so by doing something else, petty crime perhaps? Or maybe just "move in" on someone else's patch, causing issues.

A small point but probably not thought off.

Six, these proposals will definitely impact on the economy not just of Rangers but local businesses that THRIVE on the supporters of Rangers.

In short these proposals should not be implemented until such times as the underground stations nearby have lift access and also an overground train station created nearby on existing old lines.

Currently the public transport infrastructure is overcrowded whenever an event is held; the subway in particular akin to rush hours scenes on the Japanese railway with people pushed in (https://youtu.be/3UUg0_qIjBE).

Restricting parking around the stadium will only add to this overcrowding. Providing no additional public transport facilities within this proposal is highly irresponsible in my opinion. Having the car reasonably close to hand when attending a match can be the difference between being able to go to the football, or not being able to attend at all. For example, I work shifts including weekends so sometimes have to leave the area around 4.40 to get back to [REDACTED] in time for work.

Please consider whether this scheme is beneficial to all before enforcements are made.

I wish to register my support for Rangers FC's objection to the proposed parking restrictions on match days.

As a [REDACTED] I appreciate the need for sustainability of urban transportation networks in general and road safety in particular but believe this proposal is absolutely flawed in that it makes no provision for suitable alternatives to the use of the private car and the individual needs of members of the public accessing football matches at Ibrox Stadium. Neither supporters buses nor the Glasgow public transport system can possibly cope with the extra demand if cars are no longer permitted parking access within reasonable walking distance of the stadium. The Underground service in particular will suffer intolerable strain and its Park and Ride facilities will come under increased demand to the detriment of non-football supporter users.

There will be three significant impacts should these measures progress,

1. parking congestion will simply be pushed out into areas currently unaffected by any on-street parking problem, much to the detriment of the amenity of those neighbourhoods
2. traffic congestion hot spots will shift and manifest itself in areas currently enjoying free traffic flows
3. less football supporters will visit the city on match days meaning less cash revenue for local businesses

I have no doubt there will be other unintended consequences which can not even be guessed at present. What we have at the moment is a known commodity and something everyone, public and emergency services alike, are familiar with and able to adapt to and cope with in any given scenario. If the motive is to ensure a freer flow of emergency access then this should be secured by other means and even then balanced against a reasonable assessment of the demand/necessity for improvement. How often have there been problems experienced by emergency vehicles accessing the stadium? Is this even an issue requiring of a solution or is it, as one might reasonably suspect in the absence of empirical evidence, simply an exercise in theoretical best practice?

Until such time as the Council can demonstrate a verifiable need for clearer emergency access and increased parking controls as an effective means of securing that, this proposal should be resisted.

Having reviewed the proposals I would strongly oppose them on the grounds that the current availability of services could not possibly meet the inevitably increase in demand.

Pushing the parking area further away from the stadium will have wide ranging impact on event attendees. This will see people who have to drive either have to park even further away and be forced to walk a further distance to the stadium in our mainly inclement weather conditions resulting in a negative experience or spend longer still navigating the already insufficient public transport system.

Currently , I see no additional services proposed to handle the inevitable increase in usage of public services to and from the stadium. Should there be a shuttle service from city centre or a massive increase in underground trains or indeed reliable bus transport from a central area to the stadium then there is a possibility that these could be implemented but not before suitable alternatives have been introduced.

With public transport struggling to cope with the matchday traffic as it is e.g. The Subway, putting these restrictions in place will make public transport even more congested and significantly add onto journey times of thousands of supporters.

A lot of supporters also need to use their cars on match days so they can transport families, young children, elderly people, people with disabilities etc. Public transport in many cases is unsuitable for them - would they also be subject to the restrictions?

More alternatives need to be looked at before thinking of going ahead with the restrictions. A possible idea could be looking into reopening the Ibrox railway station.
