All applications for permits will be decided and monitored by the Council's Customer and Business Services team, any unusual activity or irregularities will be reported for an investigation to be carried out.

All permits being displayed on vehicles will be marked with a hologram to prevent forgery and any suspected fraudulent use of permits can be reported to the Council which my enforcement team can investigate.

The £10 charge for a 10 year resident's visitor parking permit is an administration fee to contribute towards the processing of the application. Please note that these permits are only required for vehicles visiting residential properties within the zone during operational hours and additional permits can be applied for when necessary, even if the scheme is already in operation.

As a Glaswegian who now lives slightly outwith the city, I have no direct public transport to Ibrox Stadium so am compelled to use my car. (On one occasion I used public transport into the city and from the city back to Ibrox but to be honest it was a joke and the public transport provided could not cope with the volume of supporters attempting to use it) lesson learned and something I am unlikely to repeat.

I park my vehicle as close to the ground as possible and it has worked well for me for nearly 2 decades.

If you implement your proposals, I will continue to travel by car and park slightly further away from the stadium. I'd imagine most would do the same so effectively if the council somehow imagines there's some sort of problem around Ibrox, all you will do is push the problem elsewhere.

I read one of the reasons you are thinking about this ridiculous idea is to allow emergency vehicles easier access in the surrounding areas and especially along Paisley Road West. In over 40 years of travelling to Ibrox along the PRW, I have yet to witness an emergency vehicle being stuck due to parked cars. I have seen them travelling slightly slower purely due to the volume of people leaving the ground at the same time.

I see no reason for the council to implement this proposal other than to cause as much disruption to football supporters as possible. I suggest you scrap these ridiculous parking restriction proposals and direct Council resources to tackle the real priorities and issues, you could start by fixing the craters in the roads in and around Glasgow, which are a absolute disgrace.

Hello,

I would like to formally lodge my objection to the proposed parking restrictions around Ibrox Stadium on matchday.

As a season ticket holder at Ibrox for the last 10 years I regularly drive to home games at Ibrox Stadium and park in [REDACTED] as I and 4 friends travel from [REDACTED]. This leaves us a 10 minute walk to and from the stadium and upon leaving at full time we are away and clear of the Ibrox area within 25 minutes.

With the proposed parking restrictions affecting [REDACTED], in our situation I believe there are likely to be 2 possible outcomes.

1. Congested Parking occurs at the edge of the Restriction Zone, closer to Govan Town Centre, Elder Park and ultimately the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital leaving all these routes heavily congested before and after the match.

I understand one of the aims of this proposed restriction is to provide better access for emergency services, but surely moving thousands of fans and vehicles closer to the hospital will cause further congestion and disruption to these services.

2. Bus Services from Govan to Braehead/ Erskine will be heavily over subscribed as thousands of fans make their way to the west of the city outwith the Glasgow City Boundary. This poses a number of problems as the current bus services (2 routes) already appear close to capacity on the occasions where I have attempted to get back to [REDACTED] after matchdays.

It could also be expected that this situation would have a negative impact on the current everyday users of this bus service as thousands of fans board public transport leaving a cramped and unpleasant experience.

I believe this could also cause a number of safety issues around Govan town centre on Rangers vs Celtic matchdays with a large number of Rangers fans having to pass through the area where there are a number of Celtic pubs. This could lead to the anti social behaviour especially around [REDACTED] pub which was widely shared on social media after one Old Firm fixture last season.

At present there does not appear to be sufficient transport links back to the west of Glasgow from the Ibrox area. I believe the current restrictions in place in the immediate vicinity of the stadium are sufficient and allow fans to leave the Ibrox area in the most efficient way. The proposed further restrictions will only cause more congestion in the surrounding area.

I object on the following grounds:

- The underground which I use when possible is already overcrowded and I have real safety concerns for my children and me as it is without the obvious increase in traffic these proposals will undoubtedly bring
