I am a resident of and deeply regret that I cannot support the EDZP scheme we so badly need.

I have attended community meetings and looked at the drawings regarding this matter.

Many concerns have been raised and amendments put forward by our community which LES appear to have completely ignored.

The scheme as proposed has been extremely poorly thought through and as presented should not be implemented. Objections to the scheme are:

- 1. The permits to be issued are not being limited to residents only.
- 2. LES intend to issue free permits to all businesses and organisations within the zoned area. Why, how many and on what basis?
  - Businesses and organisations have ample parking facilities to allow normal activities and should not be issued with an unknown number of open zone permits.
- 3. Permits issued to such bodies should be short term, day permits, issued on application against specific circumstances. (just like applying for a permit to site a skip)
- 4. It has been proposed there be no limit on the number of visitor permits that a resident, business or other organisation can obtain. This is open to massive abuse.
- 5. Permits proposed are to be are general permits, not zoned permits, with no reference to the address against which it was issued. No traceability! Again open to massive abuse with permits obtained from one area allowing parking in another.
- 6. From drawings inspected LES appear to have opened up areas for parking with open zone permits which were previously protected via coning! Effectively increasing the parking problem.
- 7. The validity period of 10 years must not be permitted. Any scheme should start with a one year traceable permit validity should matters in fact be made worse, then changes can be made or arrangements adjusted to suit the reality.
- 8. The scheme proposed by LES is so poorly constructed in detail, with no evidence of system control or monitoring methodology being in place, that it will be massively abused and unfortunately lead to greater. levels of traffic and car parking in our 'Conservation Area'.

I hereby request our First Minister and our Councillors to intervene and ensure that any parking control scheme proposed is heavily revised in favour of the residents in the areas it is supposed to benefit.



The current level of public transport around the stadium is already inadequate and a ban on parking will only exacerbate the situation.

Currently, the subway is already overcrowded and has long delays pre and post match time. Further, the bus routes are infrequent and do not cover the destinations required by the majority of the supporters.

I believe that there are no plans in place to address the public transport levels so I fail to understand

how a ban on private transport parking will in any way alleviate the congestion for residents during match days,

which apparently this scheme was intended.

It would also make it difficult for away supporters. It would mean everyone having to get back into town at the same time.


There would be more people drinking alcohol and instead of just clearing the area after a game, it would make it more dangerous for everyone (I'm female and attend games and go alone).





I write in regard of the upcoming implementation of parking changes and restrictions in and around Ibrox stadium.

On initial proposal these plans seem to offer nothing but hassle, compete disregard for safety and no thought given to those of elderly or frail nature.

No improved transport links have been put in place. An already packed transport network which currently struggles with pre and post match crowds will now be even busier adding to delays and queues to use those facilities.

As much as it's meant to add to saftey in and around the staidum, you will now have masses of crowds walking from even further away, adding to footfall in and around the areas adjacent to the stadium. No proposal for safe enclosed or marked out walk ways has been suggested. In addition, no consideration is given to the elderly who although may not be classed as disabled blue badge holders, still rely on their own transport to get as near the stadium as possible before walking the final stretch. Using and accessing public transport isn't an option for some of these people and rely on the car to get them to matches. This could cause many elderly severe issues and may prevent them from now being able to attend matches.

The initial proposals are highlighted as helping businesses in the local area. In many surrounding streets adjacent to ibrox, local businesses are closed on Saturdays after noon, well before the football traffic starts to appear. Also, several of these businesses rely on an income from opening up their parking areas for use of the travelling supporters. Hardly supporting them, when making it norm to park no where near them.

I ask that deep considerations are taken before carrying on with these radical changes to the current system. A system that has worked for years and inhale no doubt, will do for many years to come.

Bus operators have noted that no real improvement can be made due to the volume of traffic in the area both prior to and after a game. They would be happy to review this but only when there is less traffic in the area. SPT also noted that Shields Road Park and Ride had capacity to be utilised further on match days.

In addition to the above, supporter's buses would be accommodated within the zone. The locations for dedicated supporter bus parking have been agreed with Police Scotland as they manage this facility on match days. If, in the future, there appears to be insufficient accommodation for the number of supporter buses parking in the area then the Council, in conjunction with Police Scotland, can look to provide additional locations where practicable.
