Inside Housing are reporting that "Ministers have abandoned plans to allow social landlords to update the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) about changes to tenants' rents in bulk after testing the system for 18 months. This means that it'll be the responsibility of every tenant who lives in RSL property, for example a Glasgow Housing Association house, to notify DWP when their rent changes and by how much. Fairly straightforward if you are able to use IT, however for those who are not digitally aware it could cause rent arrears to build up, anxiety, negative impact on their credit score and potential threat of eviction.

STEM - Pathway Out of Poverty

Bernard Rospendowski is a member of the PLP's Community Activist Panel (CAP) and his passion is the promotion of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) in the community and workplace as an effective means to tackle poverty by the creation of jobs and wealth based on STEM ideas generation and development. STEM promotion may involve highlighting its relevance to everyday life and disadvantaged young people in particular may then see the importance of STEM resulting in ideas generation and in educational attainment gap mitigation.

Bernard has been involved in encouraging STEM promotion in the community by getting involved with retail businesses, for example representing CAP at STEM event days in The Forge Shopping Centre in Parkhead.

Schools, colleges, universities, libraries, science centres, museums and art galleries, sport centres, community centres, and health providers, etc., can be involved in STEM promotion.

STEM may now be perceived as more relevant to everyday life by virtue of the devastating effects of the coronavirus crisis and the development, using bioscience, of vaccines, etc. In order to regenerate jobs and wealth, lost due to the coronavirus crisis, and so prevent a descent into impoverishment for many, STEM promotion will be indispensable. The green economy, including renewable energy and green transport, with its reliance on STEM may produce many jobs in the near and long term. The emergence of artificial intelligence (AI) and robotics and the coronavirus-induced increased use of digital information and communications technology will require that current and future generations be versed in STEM skills.

Restart Programme

Restart is an NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde project that supports NHS-referred individuals who are experiencing, or are recovering from, mental health issues. The project provides therapeutic and employment-oriented training, which is based at Alexandra Park, Bridgeton, Firhill, and Maryhill. Training topics include: information technology; music; catering; horticulture; woodwork; art; creative writing; digital photography; genealogy; and mathematics. Bernard Rospendowski is the Restart Maths Tutor.
