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Stay Alert for Fraudulent Emails and Cyber Attacks

Cybercrime continues to be a real and current danger for the council family. It is increasingly being used by criminals who attempt to induce us into providing information for fraudulent purposes and as a means of introducing viruses and ransomware into our networks in order to disrupt services and extort payments.

Staff are therefore asked to be extra vigilant and keep a look out for anything which appears to be suspicious, **especially emails**.

We all have a vital role in protecting the information we use and share every day, ensuring we keep our colleagues, citizens and suppliers safe.

Staff are asked to refresh their knowledge and <u>visit our key pages</u> to understand the different types of phishing and how to prevent and report them.

Email: report anything suspicious!

- If you receive any email that looks suspicious report it immediately
- We would advise you to report anything that you are simply not sure about to help protect our systems
- Do not open any hyperlinks embedded in the email
- Do not open any attachments to the email

How to 'report it'

For emails in Outlook use the 'Report Phishing' button on your taskbar to mark the suspicious email
quickly and easily

Susanne Millar, Chief Executive recently took time out to visit staff at Pollok Country Park and Scientific Services

During her visit to Pollok Country Park, Susanne saw first hand the dedicated work of the livestock team and spent time with Livestock Supervisor, Mellisa Curran, LANTRA Award winning Livestock Apprentice Hannah Walsh, and Livestock Assistants Matt Auld and Shaun Curran, who gave an insight into their commitment to animal welfare.

Susanne also toured the Glasshouses and growing spaces with gardeners Paul Hilton, Mathew Loyd and apprentices noting the impressive food-growing initiatives that directly support soup kitchens and food banks in the wider Glasgow community. This visit further highlighted the park's vital social contributions through this food outreach.

Susanne also engaged with Countryside Rangers, Lindsay Torrance and Fiona Greenlees, learning about their crucial nature restoration projects and educational outreach with local schools.

Furthermore, she acknowledged the essential administrative support provided by Ann McLaren, which ensures the smooth operation of the park's diverse services. Insights into the management of Pollok Country Park were provided by Supervisors Michael McNellis and Andrew Bradburn, along with Manager James Niblock.

Drew McWilliams, Group Manager, Parks said "It was good to highlight to Susanne, Pollok Country Park's significant role as Glasgow's largest and only Country Park, offering a vital green sanctuary for both visitors and wildlife, a status diligently maintained by its dedicated and hardworking staff. Staff enjoyed the opportunity to share their specific roles and how they contribute to the city as a whole".

Scientific Services were also delighted to host a visit by Susanne, who saw how samples are received by our skilled office staff and then toured the laboratory meeting staff from the Microbiology, Chemistry and Calibrations. Susanne heard how the analysis conducted is invaluable in supporting Environmental Health, Trading Standards, and the wider community. Jane White, Group Manager, Scientific Services said, "We really appreciated Susanne taking time out of her busy schedule to learn more about the work we carry out."

Commenting on her recent site visits, **Susanne Millar, Chief Executive said**: "In the year since my appointment as Chief Executive, a priority for me has been getting out of the City Chambers and visiting the different parts of our authority that are based in communities across the city.

I've learned an incredible amount from teams in every Service and from our close partners.

I don't want to be remote from any of my colleagues and have enjoyed seeing the hard work and dedication of NRS staff including those at the council's Scientific Services lab, our parks depot in Pollok Country Park

and those who showed me the fantastic investments we have made in Elder Park.

It has been great to see officers delivering our ambitious plans to modernise our historic tenement buildings, those dedicated to supporting local communities through the PMGC Programme, and those protecting them as part of our Firework Control Room.

All of these visits remind me of the fantastic work, skill and compassion of our staff every day in their jobs. I look forward to meeting many more this year."

NRS colleagues showcase new active travel route to Cabinet Secretary for Transport

Colleagues from NRS recently showcased a major new active travel route on Glasgow's Southside to Fiona Hyslop, the Cabinet Secretary for Transport.

The first phase of Connecting Battlefield has transformed the safety and accessibility of Queens Drive and Langside Road for people who walk, wheel and cycle.

The project delivered by our Sustainable Transport Team has significantly improved public space and created a new, segregated cycle way on Queens Drive which extends south onto Langside Road.

The cycle way, which is seeing around 900 daily users, provides easy access to key destinations such as Queens Park and the New Victoria Hospital. The route also links to the South City Way at Victoria Road, offering people who cycle a direct, speedy path into the city centre.

Traffic signals now prioritise those walking, wheeling, and cycling in the area. Widened, resurfaced footways and step-free pedestrian crossings have enhanced accessibility, while upgraded street lighting now illuminates the area.

Local greenspaces have been improved with low-level planting, while the historic railings surrounding Queens Park on Langside Road have been refurbished, as have the lanterns which adorn the park entrance gate pillars.





Kevin Argue, Head of Service for Sustainable Transport, Traffic and Parking Operations said: "This new cycle route and improved public space will encourage more sustainable transport in the area. The number of cyclists using the route speak for themselves, showing that if you create safe, segregated active travel infrastructure in our city, people will use it.

"I am delighted at the hard work and commitment of my team, and it was a highlight to be able to show the Cabinet Secretary for Transport, Fiona Hyslop what we had created and how well used the new route is. The project has also been shortlisted for a Scottish Transport Award in the 'Excellence in Walking, Public Realm and Cycling' category."

The first phase of Connecting Battlefield which was completed last November, was funded by Transport Scotland's Active Travel Transformation Fund. Phase two, which will focus on Grange Road, Battlefield Rest junction and Battlefield Road at Mount Florida is currently at the detailed design stage, with construction expected to start later this year.


The NRS Road Safety Unit will also be using the advert to support School Travel Plans and promote cycling as a fun, healthy, and sustainable travel option for pupils and families.



Parks and Open Spaces Benefit From £3m Fund

Parks and Open Spaces throughout Glasgow are benefitting from an innovative £3m fund fully guided by community decisions.

Almost 350 projects that will renew and improve everything from play areas, paths, ponds and planting places have been identified for investment through the Parks and Open Spaces Fund. Over 200 schemes across all 23 council wards have already been completed and a further 142 schemes are now in the pipeline following the creation of the £3m fund in the council budgets set in 2022 and 2023.

Community input has been at the heart of how the money has been spent with ideas on how to develop local green spaces being proposed through Glasgow's 23 Area Partnerships, which are made up of councillors, community councils and other local representatives.

The area partnerships have worked closely with the council's Parks team to hone the proposals and turn them into viable projects that could be delivered on the ground. This participatory budget process is new to the council and how the Parks and Open Spaces Fund has been implemented will inform future work to involve communities in spending decisions.

Taken together all the work completed through the Parks and Open Spaces Fund will support the council's wider objectives to boost biodiversity, strengthen resilience to climate change, encourage active travel and support accessibility to the city parks.

Examples of projects supported by the fund include:

- Festival Park, £26,750 for pond improvements, landscaping, new benches and accessible picnic tables
- Tobago Street, £40,044 for play area improvements, including installation of a new pirate ship
- Elderslie Street, £21,384 on new planters, seating, a sensory garden and planting ten fruit trees
- Knightswood Park, £41,000 on new entrance, new footway and upgraded path
- Clyde Walkway at Elderslie Path, £18,400, planting on 220m embankment
