1. IDENTIFY THE POLICY, PROJECT, SERVICE REFORM OR BUDGET OPTION:

a) Name of the Policy, Project, Service Reform or Budget Option to be screened

The Glasgow City Council (Kelvin Way) (Traffic Management) Order 202_

b) Reason for Change in Policy or Policy Development

To restrict vehicular traffic and improve accessibility for active travel modes on Kelvin Way.

The project is to upgrade the temporary measures introduced on Kelvin Way as part of the Spaces for People programme during 2020, as a response to Covid – 19.

c) List main outcome focus and supporting activities of the Policy, Project, Service Reform or Budget Option

Key aspects of the project include:

- Amendment to the existing Traffic Regulation Order to restrict vehicular through movements from Sauchiehall Street to University Avenue
- Amendment to the existing Traffic Regulation Order to implement a one-way system for northbound vehicular traffic from Sauchiehall Street to the access road to Kelvingrove Museum.
- Amendment to the existing Traffic Regulation Order to introduce a two way cycle lane on Kelvin Way from Sauchiehall Street to the access road to Kelvingrove Museum.
- Amend the existing parking and loading restrictions on Kelvin Way.

Glasgow's transport vision is to provide a world class transport system which is safe, reliable, integrated and accessible to all citizens and visitors and also supports the physical, social, economic, cultural, environmental and economic regeneration of the City. In order to achieve this, the Local Transport Strategy (LTS) concentrates on promoting and enhancing sustainable transport modes such as walking, cycling and public transport.

More specifically, the measures make an important contribution towards the Council's commitment to 'prioritise sustainable transport across the city' (Priority 55).

The Regulations require that Safety Notices are advertised on street and this will be undertaken in line with normal procedures. In addition, information on restrictions will be made available online and through social media channels.</p>

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Summary of Protected Characteristics Most Impacted

For most groups with Protected Characteristics, the proposed enhanced measures on Kelvin Way will have a positive impact by providing a safer environment for those walking and cycling. These measures will also help to create more liveable places that put people, rather than vehicles, first.

There is potential for some people with physical disabilities to be negatively impacted by the reduction in access or parking opportunities on Kelvin Way although there are still parking opportunities in residential streets within close proximity of Kelvingrove Park .

The design team will consider all available information and views carefully when progressing the designs and ensure, where possible, that access for all is maintained where possible.

Summary of Socio Economic Impacts

The proposals seek to improve opportunities and access to sustainable and/or active travel by enhancing local environments and improving conditions for those walking, wheeling and cycling. By addressing barriers to social mobility and improving access to services this project can help to support positive mental health and wellbeing outcomes.

The proposals support the promotion of active travel uptake and social, economic, cultural and environmental regeneration of the City by promoting low cost, efficient and effective carbon neutral transport within Glasgow.

Summary of Human Rights Impacts

The introduction of these proposals on Kelvin Way will encourage a greater number of people to walk and cycle. Separating cyclists from vehicular traffic, and restricting vehicular traffic will also assist with the reduction of accidents.

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Legislation

Equality Act (2010) - the Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties) Scotland Regulations 2012

The 2010 Act consolidated previous equalities legislation to protect people from discrimination on grounds of:

- race
- sex
- being a transsexual person (transsexuality is where someone has changed, is changing or has proposed changing their sex – called ‘gender reassignment’ in law)
- sexual orientation (whether being lesbian, gay, bisexual or heterosexual)
- disability (or because of something connected with their disability)
- religion or belief
- having just had a baby or being pregnant
- being married or in a civil partnership, and
- age.

As noted the Equality Act 2010 simplifies the current laws and puts them all together in one piece of legislation. In addition the **Specific Duties (Scotland Regulations 2012)** require local authorities to do the following to enable better performance of the general equality duty:

- report progress on mainstreaming the general equality duty
- publish equality outcomes and report progress in meeting those
- impact assess new or revised policies and practices as well as making arrangements to review existing policies and practices gather, use and publish employee information
- publish gender pay gap information and an equal pay statement
- consider adding equality award criteria and contract conditions in public procurement exercises.

Enforcement

Judicial review of an authority can be taken by any person, including the Equality and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) or a group of people, with an interest, in respect of alleged failure to comply with the general equality duty.
